FORK in the ROad


Fork in the Road will allow the audience to step into the lives of children who are thrust into the world of foster care through a series of life circumstances they had nothing to do with.

What happens when a child finds themselves in a home they are not familiar with, coexisting with people they do not know? How emotionally complicated is this for them as well as the ones who choose to care for a child that is not their own? What are some of the amazing stories of those who have flourished because of foster care?

Who are those that choose to be the beacon of hope for children who have found themselves at a fork in the road?

In 2023, Director/Producer Keith Famie, an adoptee himself, will explore the lives who are impacted by foster care journeys.

NATURE VS. NURTURE

- Twin stories *Three Identical Strangers*: It examines a set of American identical triplets, born in 1961 and adopted as six-month-old infants by separate families, unaware that each child had brothers. The separations were done as part of an undisclosed scientific "nature versus nurture" twin study, to track the development of genetically identical siblings raised in differing circumstances. Combining archival footage, re-enacted scenes, and present-day interviews, the documentary reveals how the brothers discovered one another at age 19 and thereafter sought to understand the circumstances of their separation

SAME-SEX

- The Marriage (Definition of Marriage) Amendment Act 2013, which came into force on 19 August 2013, allowed same-sex marriage and permitted married same-sex couples to jointly adopt children. Previously, an LGBT individual was able to adopt children, but same-sex couples could not adopt jointly.
- On June 26, 2015, the Supreme Court struck down all bans on same-sex marriage in the United States.
- > On March 31, 2016, a Federal District Court struck down Mississippi's ban on same-sex couples from adoption.
- On June 26, 2017, the Supreme Court reversed an Arkansas Supreme Court ruling and ordered all states to treat same-sex couples equally to opposite-sex couples in the issuance of birth certificates. These court rulings have made adoption by same-sex couples legal in all 50 states.

RECONCILIATION

- > What is it like meeting biological parents for the first time?
- > Why do adopted children choose to meet their biological family?
 - What can this do for the person?
 - Closure? Or down a rabbit hole?
- > What are the differences between people who choose to know and choose not to?
- > What happens if the person or the parents are much better off than the other?
 - What are the complications that can occur, if any? Why?
- > Why do some parents choose not to be found and other say it's okay?
- > How do the biological parents feel about their child finding them?
 - What emotions are different between the mother and father? What is the same?

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

- > We will step back in history to better understand the significance of foster care and adoption.
- One powerful story we will cover is how a Christian nurse, Irena Sendler, during WWII would smuggle children out of the Warsaw Ghetto and place them into foster care homes. Over the course of the war, she is credited with saving 2,000 plus children from the perils of the Holocaust.

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Keith Famie Director/Producer/Author

Director/Producer Keith Famie was, for many years, known as a celebrity chef and a metro Detroit restaurateur. He was selected as one of America's "Best New Chefs" in 1989 by Food and Wine magazine; Esquire Magazine chose his restaurants as "Best New Restaurant" in America on two separate occasions. Famie was also a finalist on the 2001 reality television series, "Survivor, the Australian Outback."

Keith hosted his own Food Network series, "Keith Famie's Adventures," traveling the world documenting cooking styles from the plains of Africa to monk monasteries of Taiwan, to the lifestyle of Key West. In 2004, the Adventure Chef embarked on a new journey - documentary filmmaking. "I didn't want to be the 'Adventure Chef' guy anymore. I wanted to help people tell their stories."

Since that life-changing decision, Famie has been awarded twelve Michigan Emmys and been nominated several other times for his rich, human-interest storytelling, from ethnic documentaries to military tribute films. He and his team at Visionalist Entertainment Productions create informative, entertaining films that touch a wide audience.

Along with documentary filmmaking, Famie has released several books throughout his career, Famie's Adventures in Cooking (2001), You Really Haven't Been There Until You've Eaten the Food (2003), Living Through the Lens (2019), and Papa's Rules for Life (2021).

Outside of documentary production, Keith is involved in charitable projects. In 2003, Keith finished the 25th anniversary Ironman Triathlon World Championship in Kona with Team In Training for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. In 2015, he was awarded the 2015 Diamond Award by the Association for Women in Communications Detroit Chapter. In 2017, Keith was presented the Media Award by the Gilda's Club of Metro Detroit. Over the years, Keith has been actively involved in several well-respected, Michigan-based 501(c)(3) organizations that support everything from children with cancer and hunger relief to veterans' issues.

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
